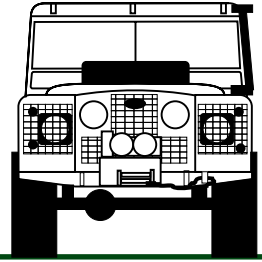

General Information

Ottawa Valley Land Rovers is the oldest and largest Land Rover club in Canada. Membership is open to all Land Rover enthusiasts. Executive meetings are held on the first Monday of every month. Social meetings are held on the third Monday of every month, generally at the Prescott Hotel on Preston Street.

OVL R offers a monthly newsletter and a variety of activities throughout the year, from mechanical seminars and off-road rallies to social events and family oriented outings. Members receive discounts on parts from a number of North American suppliers. Off-road activities come in several categories. The light version, which is usually entertainment during a rally or at one of our family summer events, consists of a little "mud bogging" or tours along country lanes. The heavy stuff, which is usually several days across public lands navigating by compass, topographical maps and aerial photos, involves bridge building, river barging, and driving conditions ranging from cedar swamp to rocky hill winching.

Membership: Canadians joining throughout the year pay \$45 CDN per year, Americans and others pay \$45 US per year (discounts available if you receive newsletter by email). Membership is valid for one year.

Land Rover LRX Concept

Land Rover will show what it calls a vision of its future at the North American International Auto Show in Detroit in January with the world debut of the LRX concept. Why is the LRX a vision of Land Rover's future? Company design boss Gerry McGovern said the LRX's design signals Land Rover's shift into new areas of the market. In other words, Land Rover hopes to attract a whole new group of customers with a compact, environmentally friendly SUV.

The LRX, which looks sort of like a Mini on steroids, is a three-door wagon, the concept based on the LR2 platform. Land Rover officials said that if it's built, it will be built on a new platform. It is the smallest Land Rover the company has ever made.

"LRX has unmistakable Land Rover design and the breadth of capability that you'd expect from our vehicles," said Phil Popham, Land Rover managing director. "But it carries those essentials into a segment where the brand has never been before, and with a proposed level of efficiency that would make it one of the cleanest vehicles in its class. It is Land Rover's way of affirming the brand's responsible approach to future product development."

This is the first new Land Rover since McGovern became design director.

"LRX is a design born out of passion for the brand, but it is different, relevant, engaging and exciting," said McGovern.

Land Rover sees the LRX's



compact size as one of its advantages, hoping it will appeal to those who want a smaller SUV with Land Rover cachet. The company also figures that if it's produced, the LRX's lower weight and reduced aerodynamic drag will help improve fuel efficiency and reduce emissions.

Land Rover revealed just a few powertrain details when we looked at the LRX but said more will come at the show. They did say it has full-time four-wheel drive and hill-descent control, as well as a new version of Land Rover's excellent Terrain Response system, which optimizes traction on surfaces ranging from icy roads to wet grass, gravel and snow. The LRX's Terrain Response is unique in that it has an Eco mode for lower emissions.

The interior is tan and dark chocolate leather with polished aluminum details. The instruments use floating LCD graphics to create a three-dimensional look, and a touch-screen area has an interactive display and an iPhone docking station. The seats are attached to the center console and thus "float" individually, giving an impression of a light, airy interior while creating useful underseat and underfloor stowage areas.

On either side of the tailgate, removable speakers include an iPod docking station. Also out back is a cooler and bottle chiller that can be clipped to the lowered tailgate.

The LRX has several sustainability tricks, such as the polycarbonate side glass (about 40 percent lighter), vegetable-tanned leather (chromium-free, better for recycling), extensive use

of aluminum (both lightweight and recyclable) and carpeting made of felt from sustainable sources. The off-white door inserts and headliner are of 100 percent recycled material made from used plastic bottles.

“We are determined to make sustainability a key element in our future product design and the way we do business, while



still creating vehicles that have a strong emotional appeal as well as fulfilling people’s practical needs,” said Popham. “No single technology delivers all the answers to whole-life sustainability, but the LRX concept brings together some of the ideas for the future that interest us, integrating them into a car that we believe represents an exciting way forward for Land Rover.”

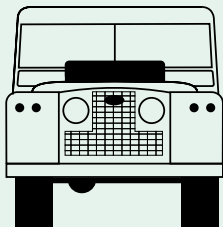
Dear OVL R member,

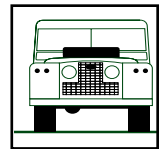
