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General Information

Ottawa Valley Land Rovers is the oldest and largest Land Rover club in Canada. Membership is open to all Land Rover enthusiasts. Executive meetings are held on the first Monday of every month. Social meetings are held on the third Monday of every month, generally at the Prescott Hotel on Preston Street.

OVLR offers a monthly newsletter and a variety of activities throughout the year, from mechanical seminars and off-road rallies to social events and family oriented outings. Members receive discounts on parts from a number of North American suppliers. Off-road activities come in several categories. The light version, which is usually entertainment during a rally or at one of our family summer events, consists of a little "mud bogging" or tours along country lanes. The heavy stuff, which is usually several days across public lands navigating by compass, topographical maps and aerial photos, involves bridge building, river barging, and driving conditions ranging from cedar swamp to rocky hill winching.

Membership: Canadians joining throughout the year pay \$45 CDN per year, Americans and others pay \$45 US per year (discounts available if you receive newsletter by email). Membership is valid for one year.

St. Patrick's trail – this activity involves some clearing (3) large fallen trees will need to be cut into sections and pulled out of the way, we will also need to cut some small cedars, no hardwoods, before being able to complete the circuit. It should be passable by both large (Range Rover / Disco) and small (SWB Series) trucks without damage, beyond some pin-striping. Those who opt not to run their vehicles around the trail will be entertained by watching those who do, they can also assist in obstacle clearing and marshalling.

First Annual Fallout Event

September 25th heralded the first annual Fallout Event hosted by Dom and Scarlett Perodeau, aka LRS (Land Rover Salvage) in Madoc, Ontario.

As the day dawned and with both the Weather Network and Environment Canada promising showers, three of us from Ottawa headed out to meet four of the Toronto area members roughly halfway in Madoc. The goal was to offroad to Lingham Lake which is nestled between Highways 7 and 17 and 62 and 41, surrounded by hundreds of smaller lakes, streams, puddles and other water bodies, all having been topped up by one of the wettest Septembers in memory.

Mother Nature relented and barely misted the windshields for most of the day, never living up to the dire warnings, which suited us fine.

Dom and Scarlett greeted us as we arrived about 11:30 and we puttered about until everyone that was coming got there. We took stock of our number (9 for now and 2 more for dinner) and then headed out towards the trail head, off Hwy 62. We went through Madoc for Dom to refuel, but niggly problems with his offroader resulted in him swapping it for their Range Rover... which should probably be named Poupon, but I digress.

After a second start from the local Tim Horton's, we headed up 62 in a little rain.

I should mention that while I drove my street Disco II to Madoc, I decided on the relative comfort of the jump seat in Stan for the day, mostly to give me the opportunity to take some pictures and give my kidneys a break from the constant pounding, as Dave Pell would be nursing Stan through the trails. My doctor says the MRI shows no sign of serious concussion.

I was also tasked with leading from the back seat as I had a map, but this proved to be challenge for me, what

I skipped a side trail with an arrow painted on a board and we headed out under the towers. Sure enough in about 400 yards it became obvious that the trail behind us was the one to Lingham Lake. We turned around and started out once again toward the Lake.

The first km of the trail was really a string of puddles and water holes, but with a solid bottom and not many rocks. Between the map I had and several GPS's we kept on the trail until we came to the stream in the pictures. While at first it seemed a little deep, after Kevin went through, the others picked a line based on Ed's coldblooded wading and got to the other side... we
