
Land Rover's latest products

Winches come in many shapes, sizes and capacities, but all that can be better delt with in other articles. In answer to a question in the last issue of TB, here is a rough article to Capstan Winch, in either the 88" or 109". Note that minor componet differences occur between petrol and diesel engines, and that a hand-throttle is a must, and Land Rover recommends heavy-duty springs for the front end. Here

Step 1: Ensure all parts have been obtained (fabricated, borrowed, 'etq' and enough tools are at hand.

Step 2: The book says to remove the grill and radiator but I found if the holes are still clear in the block for the winck shaft

support plates, you can leave the grill and rad in place.

Step 3: .. Drill a 27/64th (10.318mm) hole, or the required size for the rivet nut tool that your using (The DOCAP RIVET NUT TOOL KIT p/n 656-700 marketed by DOCAP(1985) Corp., Rexdale Ont. M9W-5M2 is the easiest method for fastening rivnuts. Ask for the adapter and one size larger mivnut) Dmill the first 27/64th hole in the front face of the second chassis crossmember (bumper is the first) midway between the sidemembers and 3. 9/16 " from the top face.

Step 4: 2 Vinstall rivnut in hole. Take the winch support plate and secure the center hole with a suitable bolt to your rivnut. Mark the remaining four holes in the second crossmember and the 5 5/16" holes in the bumper. Remove the support plate and drill all the holes

you just marked

Remove the starting dog, and install the new driving Step 5: plate. Make sure you have the petrol and not the diesel one! (if installing winch on a petrol engine)

DATE OF SERVICE Install the shaft support brackets to the engine front and install the drive system. (if you were ambitious enough to start this project, you can probably do this without a long winded explanation.)

Step 7: Bolt the winch support plate in position, offer the winch to the support plate, engageing the drive shaft into the sleeve in the winch, and bolt firmly into place. Stainless bolts are worth the extra cost:

Step 8: Install the 'Dog - Clutch' mechanism.

Drill the required holes and install the rope guide Step 9: (roller fairlead)

Step 10: Fill the winch with S.A.E. 40 oil and grease all other moveing parts, not forgeting the grease nipple on the bollard shaft. Step 11: Check before use add grease / oil routines to your planned maintenance.

This is not a 'fool-proof' method, but one I developed while installing my winch on a 2. 1/41 petrol 88". Good luck, and lets all 'pull together'. For a full and detailed explanation, see:

Sorry Sorry Sorry for not getting back to you sooner. So much has been happening around here to keep me busy, I've let the time fly by.

I was in a shop buying parts for the Jeep and spied an application form for entry to the Camel Trophy Australia '86. The owner of the estab. wouldn't let me have the form, but aggreed, after much persausion from me (persistence?) to copy it. I filled out the application on a lark and sent it in. Sweated it out for a few weeks. I received a large packet in the mail containing forms, picture note book and congrats letter from R.J. Reynolds Tobacco International. BIG money people.

I flew to San Francisco, rented a car, drove to Sears point Raceway they paid all expenses. They started testing Sat morning by driving jeeps through mud and slop and custom built rock hill. Testing reconneitre of approach and departure and of course winching ability. Piece of cake for me, others were having a hard time. Score 1 pt. Next chainsaw demo and usage. Cut a 2 foot section of tele pole with a saw. 2 pts. Rain and rain etc made the testing interesting. After steak and potato dinner complete with wine and cake, we were shown a video of past Trophies throughout the world. Great action shots - lots of Rovers and mud.

Night came and we (18 finalists of 600 applicants) were driven to drop points in the boonies, 2 to a team. (This) test was a map and compass course (basic points on a compass). My partner (had) never used a compass before. At least we had flashlights. We had to find a orange traffic cone in the dark by following a map. We found it fairly easily after star gazing for a while. 3 pts. Back to the first aid demo and beer and snacks before a wet night. Rain, Rain. We were given air mats to sleep on - some of the lighter guys floated around so it was quite interesting.

Sunday morn after breakfast a 3 mile cross country run/walk through, over, under trees, bush, ravines. etc. with a 120' rope crossing over a deep, cold pond hand over foot. The last 3/4 mile we had to carry the 2 foot section we cut from the tele pole. My what fun. I did blow the compentition away. (what was left of it). Then a heavy interview with the people of RJR, phsychologist, and noted offroaders. I tried not to get too political about my views on smoking and beaurocracy and long hair. They asked if I were picked would I cut my hair. Hell NO!!

I got to meet 4WD notables Mark Smith (Darien Gap, Expedition de las Americas etc.), the Turtle Expedition People, Garry and Monika Wescott who got rid of their Rover after 11 years of Central, South and North American travel - bought a GMC P/U with camper, and the American team from Papua New Guinea Camel Trophy.

Cleaned up the mud vehicles. Drove a new Rover 90, last years Camel Rover from Borneo. At the banquet that night we were given Camel watches, lighter, flashlight, and little survival kits etc. I got picked along with 3 others as "The Team".

2 weeks later we flew 1st class to London thence to Birmingham 5 Star Hotel. Next day a bus picked us up along with the Brazilian and German teams. We all went to the "right side" of the bus to get on - no door - ah yes - we're in England. Bloody dumb Americans - the door is on the left side. We all failed that test!!!

Had a tour of the Rover factory heaven - hundreds of Rovers, Range Rovers. Walked the Rover 90 assembly line. The new 90; all coil spring disc brake front and optional V-8 engine. 5 speed trans with lock full time 4WD, custom interior, etc. etc. Very nice vehicles.

After the tour of the Rover factory we were bussed to the grand 5000 acre Eastnor Castle Estate complete with 14th century castle and large herd of raindeer etc.

The Rover demonstration team let us abuse their new Rover 90's and 110's in, under and around some of the deepest and longest mudholes I've seen since the Everglades. They taught us some neat tricks and gave a good critique of driving habits; they also taught the people who have never driven off road how to use 4WD & winch. As for the American team, we had a blast. It's not often one gets a brand new Rover with winch and Michelin mud tyres to thrash the boonies with. They would point us to a big hole and say get across that; halfway through they would stop us and of course we'd be stuck - dare not open the doors, climb out window onto the hood and search for the winch clutch knob under water and winch out trying to at least keep the chest and shoulders dry. We stayed in large tents called 'Marquees', one for sleeping and one for eating and lectures etc.

As we arrived, the Brits and Aussies were leaving - great chaps. Actually all the teams we met were nice folks. Dining consisted of basic English fare cooked in a mess tent by a great crew - served buffet style with tables set with white linen cloths, silverware, red and white wine on each table, bread plate etc etc. Very classy, eh what? (a keg of Guiness Lager was supplied for evening fun.)

We were given winch lessons using the new warn 8273 80001b winch, CPR and first aid, instruction manuals on function and operation of the Rover 90 were given out. 3 days and nights of intence driver training finalized by a test in which a 2 man team in a Rover would go into a deep revine filled with mud, drive or winch around some trees back into the revine. We did the test in 17 minutes, the closest other time was one hour.

I thought I was going to Australia, but who can tell big business. The Camel people chose my partner and one other guys. I will try again next year, as Trophy 87 will be in Madagascar.

This article will try to answer some questions about care and feeding of a 'C.B.'

The first question is invariably 'why do I need a radio?'. There are two good reasons for having a radio in your Rover.

- 1. SAFETY- This is the most important issue there can be. If a vehicle gets into difficulty, its occupants will be able to contact another party and get help. Talking to the vehicle behind you will also prevent them from starting a difficult section of track until they know that you are clear.
- 2. <u>CONVOY COMMUNICATION</u> This allows the trip leader to know the state of the convoy without being able to see them. This is very useful when turnoffs are encountered on a track, or when strung out on a highway.

Some people are concerned at the cost effectiveness of purchasing a radio system for the limited amount of time that it will be used. If you shop around at the garage sales and the like, you can come up with a good deal. There are several things to look for when examining a prospective radio. First, stick your nose into the back of the radio. If you smell a strong sharp smell, there is a possibilty that someone has connected the radio up to power with the polarty reversed. This is not a big problem in most cases because there is a protection diode that fails and protects the rest of the radio. If you suspect that there may be a problem with the set, take it to a car battery to connect it up; RED WIRE to the + terminal, BLACK WIRE to the - terminal. Turn the set on. If the lights comes on, the set is probably all right. DON'T TRANSMIT WITHOUT AN ANTENNA.

ANTENNAS. You can have the worlds best radio, but if you have a poor antenna system, the radio isn't worth a dime. In my experience, having a good antenna instalation is the best way of keeping future problems to a minimum. A antenna system comes in three parts:

- 1. Antenna
- 2. Coaxial lead (Radio to antenna)
- 3. Antenna Mount.

ANTENNA. Make sure that the antenna you choose is designed for the 27 Mhz frequency band (CB)

COAXIAL WIRE. Usually with a PL 259 connector at one end, and stakeons on the other. Comes in various lengths and diameters. Make sure that the cable impsedence is 52 ohms. To protect your radio, ALWAYS BUY

NEW COAX. Coax is very easy to dammage, and it's not expensive. If the cable is either open or shorted, your radio's transmitter can be destroyed. Coax is difficult to check out, and unless you own a 'Time Domain Reflectometer' (\$60,000+), just replace it. Multimeters are not good enough.NEVER TRY TO SPLICE COAX.

ANTENNA MOUNTS. There are as many styles of antenna mounts as there are antennas, and very few are suited to the Land Rovers thin aluminum body. The best body mount that I've come across is made by:

The Antenna Specialists Co. Part Number AS-419 side body mount.

This mount will fit above the rear door very neatly, and is not hard to install.

To ensure top performance from your radio, take your vehicle with the radio instaled to a radio technician or shop and have the antenna tuned. Any person with a VSWR meter can do this. It only takes a few minutes. VSWR (Voltage Standing Wave Ratio) is a measure of the antenna systems overall servicably. It is a ratio between the transmitted energy to energy reflected back to the radio from mismatches in the antenna or coax. Ideally, no radio frequency energy (RF) should be reflected, and the VSWR would be 1:1. Nothing is ever ideal, so readings up to 1.25:1 are acceptable. VSWR readings should be taken from time to time to asertain that everything is still correct. High VSWR readings point to a dammaged transmission line (coax) caused by pinching or internal breaks, or poor grounding of the radio and coax (at the antenna end), or corosion at the mount/antenna connection. If there are any difficulties that you can't overcome, refer them to a radio technician.

Remember, licenses are required for 40 channel radios in Canada.

EQUIPMENT AND SPARE PARTS

The following is a list of basic spare parts that should be taken on all but the easiest trips. This list was compiled from THE LAND ROVER OWNER'S CLUB OF VICTORIA'S (AUSTRALIA) members handbook. Equipment is listed in order of priority with explanations where needed. No amount of spare parts of equipment are a substitute for a vehicle in good order and sound mechanical condition.

RECOMMENDED EQUIPMENT

- 1. Front towing pintle.
- This is used for recovery work and should be mounted on the bumper as close to the center line of the vehicle as possible.

and the second second

- 2. Shovel.
- A small to medium size is most suited for digging out vehicles and calls of nature.
- 3. Solid tow bar or Flexible tow rope. Solid tow bars are usually home made. They are used for towing a disabled vehicle, making a 8 \times 8 out of 2 4 \times 4's, or as a ground anchor. A flexible tow rope should be made out of a minimum of 10mm by 4 meters wire rope with thimbles in each end. It is kept with 2 "D" shackles, minimum size 16mm.
- 4. Axe.

Recommended size approx. 2kg unless a chainsaw is carried, in which case a smaller axe will do.

5. Sweed saw.

For clearing roads and cutting firewood faster than with an axe.

I am writing partly in responce to your latest issue of TB, and partly because I may be able to help fellow owners.

Firstly, please keep up the good work. It helps us all to know there's other fellows out there facing the same problems; lack of spares, odd looks and total incomprehension at the loval garage despite the fact that L/R's can easily fixed in the most primitive conditions.

It was interesting to read your article on the L/R's at Medecine Hat, having been there myself and aquired a Lt. Wt. body after much hard work by my wife Heather and myself. It was indeed distressing to see so many vehicles cast aside. I am curious about the phrase "One is told it has to do with protecting related interests elsewhere in the country". Interests, I suspect, are not the British Armys. Whilst finding Mr Bull the same as yourselves, that he is very friendly and fair to deal with; I would agree that the prices are a little high, which is not his doing, as I believe he was guided in this price structure by persons with Land Rover interests. Now, I am left with a question. Why would fellow owners cause us all to pay a pretty penney for what are basicly second hand parts? Now I not trying to spread discontent or give offence to anyone, just trying to answer a few niggly questions. I would appreciate hearing from you on this matter. I will leave it to your discretion as to weather or not to print all/any or none of these comments.

On a brighter note, it is very encouraging to see the strides L/R Co. is making in applying its technology, now it is freed from the Leyland purse strings. If they could only have done all this 10 years ago, then we would maybe still be buying new vehicles instead of scrounging for parts in every nook and cranny of this vast country.

I an enclosing the compleated blue form. Purists will cringe, but my main Land Rover is becoming something of a hybrid, taking what I believe are the best points of the entire L/R range from IIa through the 109 VB. I started with an ex military 1965 109, bought at the British Army auction at Ruddington, Nothingham, England. A 1975 R/R V8 was added, and the old axle was replaced with a Salisbury unit. The front end has been retro fitted with a Sr III set up but retaining the late IIa(G) grill. This was to improve cooling, but failed. Now I am looking for a N. American (shades of GM takeover) radiator to fit in place of the 2.1/41 unit. Living on the prairies also means that the heating system is also undergoing serious modification. After 2 years and a trans Canada trip, the V8 engine found a weak link in the IIa gearbox; it being splitring grouve on the layshaft. I am going to fit a sufix 'D' layshaft. A Bearmach overdrive will help cut down on RPM whilst enabling me to keep original differential ratios. Anyone interested in doing a Rover V8 conversion should be warned that it is not easy on a LHD vehicle. and involves some drastic cutting, welding and bending to stearing gear. I can supply details and hints to anyone interested.

Now then, you mentioned in the TB about those with abilities to fix and repair L/R's to step forward, well I'm stepping forward. I enjoy fixing L/R's, and will do so for a reasonable sum if its major, or serious; advice, small fix it jobs are for free. I also maintain a 'No cure, No Pay 'policy. I'm located on the Trans Canada 35 miles east of Calgary.

<u>WINCHING TIPS</u> a) Winching cables, no mater how carefully treated, will eventually develop broken strands and/or other dammage. This is especially true of cables used on drum winchs. To help preserve them, the cables should be coated with grease or oil. These two factors make gloves a necessity when handling winch cables. Make sure that you have a pair in your vehicle.

b) When operating a capstan winch with Samson Braid as the hauser, make sure that all people are at least 20 degrees clear either side of the line of pull. Because Samson Braid stretches as much as it does, when it breaks, it tries to shrink back to its original state INSTANTLY. This is called SYNTHETIC LINE SNAPBACK, and it is very dangerous. If you are in its way, it can cut you in two. During navy testing, it was determined that the danger zone was 20 degrees either side of the line of pull. KEEP EVERYONE NOT ENVOLVED WITH THE RECOVERY AWAY FROM THE AREA.

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
