Howling engines, gnashing gears and icy roostertails flung high against a bright blue sky, the exhilaration of careening into a corner at breakneck speed, the glory of the checkered flag when the race is won. Well, maybe that's a little overstated but, for Land Rover lovers who competed in the OVLR ice races at Val des Monts, it was the real thing.

Eight Land Rovers, loaded with 14 people, camp stoves, food, deck chairs, a stopwatch and a gaggle of balloons, left centretown Ottawa in near blizzard conditions and convoyed to the land of lakes and little mountains near Perkins, Quebec last week.
