Ottawa was privileged recently to see what could be the spearhead of the return of Land Rover to Canada. During Armex "89" at Lansdowne Park, Land Rover Australia exhibited its own Isuzu diesel-powered, heavy-duty 6X6 Land Rover. This vehicle has just been accepted into service down under after a lengthy development and test period.

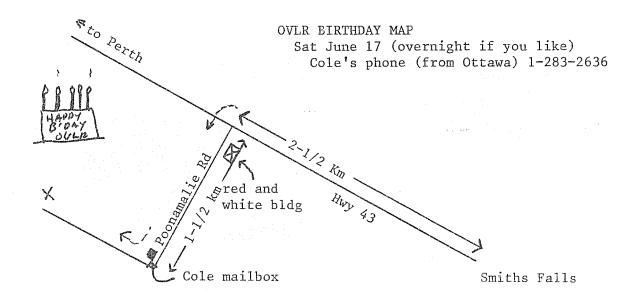
The 6X6 is being jointly developed by Land Rover Australia and General Motors Diesel Division in response to the need for a 1-1/2 tonne payload cross-country vehicle to replace the Chevrolet presently in service. The whole operation is being overseen by Land Rover at Solihul.

At presewnt, everthing is at a very early stage and I am informed by military sources that the whole project is linked to an effort by General Motors to sell the LAV 25 to Australia. As a result it is proposed that the Land Rover 6X6 would be produced in Australia minus engine and drive train and rear body. For the Canadian military market requirement it is intended to fit a GM 6.2 litre diesel engine and an automatic transmission. Upon arrival in Canada, the vehicle would be fitted with engine and drive train and rear body, be it fitted workshop, troop carrier or signal van.

Other specs for Canada include 9.00X16 tires in lieu of 7.50X16 and cold climate protection. Much has been stressed of the corrosion package to keep the 6X6 from rotting, something all Canadian owners are all too painfully aware.

As was said earlier in this article, all of this project is very tentative at present and I have been directed to contact Land Rover in Australia or the UK for further information.

As for the vehicle that was shown here, it is on its way to the UK to be used as a demonstration unit as it is right hand drive. See over for pictures.
