From the "did you know file". The chassis for the Land Rover Defender 90" is no longer made by Land Rover. That is correct. This job has now been contracted out to GKN at their plant in Telford Shropshire. The move is being seen as the start of a much larger move to have a larger percentage of all Land Rover vehicle components made by outside contractors.

Range Rover of North America has introduced a cheaper version of the Range Rover very soon. Called the Range Rover Hunter it will be the County SE version with a number of items removed. They include; CD player, cover for the cargo space, antisway bars, ABS, the leather seat with electric controls and finally that silly looking front air dam. In the US that will lower the cost of the vehicle by about USD \$10,000 to USD \$36,000. According to a reliable source we can expect to see this vehicle in Canada aswell as the two markets are being treated the same.

Another informed source tells me of a fleet of nearly thirty Discos are currently on test in the southern US in preparation for a launch there in mid '92 early '93. As we have seen with the introduction of Range Rover Canada can not be far behind. Does anybody care to deny or confirm this for me please?

Issue # 8 of Land Rover News carried a full page explanation by Mike Gould of Product Planning on the reasoning behind the decision to go with that awful Defender name. I wish he could have been with me a couple of weeks ago when I was trying to explain to a visitor from Kenya what it was all about! His first comment when I explained it all to him was, "I think everyone back home will still call it a Land Rover, Defender seems too aggressive. And anyway what was wrong with the old name?."

If there are plenty of 41 year old Series I Land Rovers still going strong, there can't be many which can better the record of KYH 628 recently returned from a round the world trip in almost as good condition as when it set out.

The car belongs to author Barbara Toy, a remarkable 82 year old, who is a veteran of countless lone expeditions all over the Middle East, Africa and India - although not all driving Pollyanna as she named the vehicle when she bought it, gleaming new from Henley's showroom in Piccadilly in 1949.

It was after her career in the theatre, first as an actress, then as an administrator, that Barbara got the travel bug and decided to travel to Baghdad to visit a friend.

Fool On Wheels

That fist trip spawned other desert journeys and the first of her books, A Fool On Wheels. Seven other books followed, each recounting episodes from her wanderings.

 But for Land Rover enthusiasts there is possibly greater romance about how her most recent trip came about.

In the sixties, after several desert journeys and a round the world trip to Australia, Pollyanna was exchanged for a new Land Rover at Solihull. Barbara recalls: "It was snowing when I got there and they were going to leave poor old Poliyanna out in the open all night. I said I wasn't going until Pollyanna got a roof over her head - so they had to remove a directors car. I drove away in my brand new Land Rover, crying like a baby."

Pollyanna Rediscovered

Despite her obvious affection for the car, Pollyanna's whereabouts were unknown to Barbara until only two years ago when, on the death of the then owner, his executors got in touch with Barbara and asked if she would like to buy Pollyanna back. An inspection visit was arranged and after only a little tickle on the SU fuel pump,

Pollyanna sprang back to life.

After all those years, the engine, a genuine Land Rover factory replacement, sounded sweet, the body was in excellent condition as was the chassis and even the bumper was straight.

Following such a good report, it was inevitable that Barbara should buy the vehicle. She enlisted the help of specialist mechanics to tidy up the few items that needed attention-rust on the steering box mounting, new points, fuel pump, re-wiring and an overhaul for the brakes -and Pollyanna was ready for the MOT.

Retraced Steps

In June of last year, Barbara set out to retrace her round the world trip of 33 years ago, in Pollyanna - the very same vehicle. To an old hand like her, Europe was plain sailing, but on arrival in the Middle East was warned not to go further.

So Barbara turned round and drove back to Greece where, with the charm that must have opened countless doors in the past, persuaded the captain of a container ship to take her and Pollyanna to Australia.

Pollyanna was crated on deck

and Barbara appeared on the crew list as "Assistant to Land Rover".

After arrival at Fremantle, a seven day drive across the arid and lonely Nullabor Plain brought the pair to Sydney where the Land Rover was shipped to Los Angeles while Barbara followed by air.

Her most vivid reaction to today's America is how roads that she remembered as virtual tracks have been turned into "Gigantic Freeways". In fact outside a small town in Arizona, on her journey across the country, she was flagged down by a policeman for driving too slowly. She says her normal speed is 50 mph but she's never in a hurry. "It unnerves people if you're in a hurry", she says.

Another disconcerting discovery is that there is no leaded petrol on sale in Texas, which made it impossible to take Pollyanna any further than Houston, which became the end of the journey apart from the ship back home.

Now Pollyanna has been finally put out to grass but Barbara says that the vehicle may go to a technical college for aspiring engineers to practice on. Some model!
