More details of the 1992 Trans-Canada/Alaska Expedition, this time with the help of The Gearbox, publication of the Rover Owners' Association of Virginia.

The 4,900-mile trip from Halifax to Anchorage, Alaska, gets underway July 1. Each day has a specific destination but participants set their own speed, gathering each evening. That approach gives individuals freedom to explore special points of interest along the way. Most travel is on paved routes except on portions in Maine, BC, the Yukon and Alaska. One-way cost for food and fuel for the six-week trek is estimated at around \$2,000 per person. You find your own way home.

Vehicles must be in top condition. The wilds of Northern Ontario is no place to be replacing a transmission. Besides a "like new" Land Rover, participants are expected to carry the following: Two mounted spare tires, two, five-gallon "Jerry" cans, an ABC fire extinguisher, a nylon recovery strap, 3/8-inch tow chain, a gallon each of engine oil, gear lube and antifreeze, two oil filters, radiator "stop leak" and hoses, a quart of brake fluid, clamps, belts, ignition parts, a good tool kit and CB radio.

In addition, organizers are calling for participants to bring camping gear and clothing for all seasons, a complete first aid kit, five gallons of potable water and five days food rations per person.

Some of our group will be joining the expedition for some or all of the trip. We'll also provide a full technical inspection (for a small donation) of any member's vehicle.

Have you got your Land Rover Owner this month? If not, the club issue is in and hilights include tips on choosing the right tire for the job, the Land Rover Story talks about the 1.6 litre series and Stateside Beat visits Nevada's Black Rock Desert.

The monthly meeting found us with \$1,083 in the bank, the best X-mas party budget in years and, if we don't burn her out in the next two months, a full-time Events Co-ordinator.

Sale of our club sweatshirts and revenue from the frame oiler will mean we're entering the new year in a healthy financial condition. Nancy Fuller volunteered to try her hand as Events Co-ordinator after the oiler de-briefing again pointed out the need. The club has been unable to find a volunteer to co-ordinate events this year, leaving the task to an already busy executive. As a result, some things have occasionally been overlooked. She'll work with Jason and VP Yves on the X-mas party prep.

Prez Jason, owner of the club trailer for licensing purposes, will investigate insurance options to allow the trailer to be used by club members. The trailer is held "in trust" by Jason for OVLR members and, at the meeting, the executive affixed their signatures to a document drawn up by an Ottawa lawyer for that purpose.

The new association between Atlantic British Parts Ltd. in Waterloo, Que. and British Rovers Inc. of Rutland, Vermont, will benefit Canadian customers by providing another source of original and aftermarket parts.

That's the word from ABP Canada owner Cliff Cochrane. Cliff and British Rovers owner Mike Wilkes have worked out a parts supply agreement. The Canadian wing of ABP split from its American parent several years ago. This summer, several former employees of Atlantic British Ltd. in Mechanicville, NY, left the company and formed British Rovers. The new company also assumed affiliation with Atlantic British's California office.

British Rovers will publish a full catelogue of Land Rover and Range Rover parts in several weeks. Right now Canadian prices will average 35 per cent over the US list but Cliff says that, with the changing Canadian dollar, it could drop to 30 per cent before too long. The 15 per cent discount OVLR members have enjoyed with Cliff will continue on all regular sales items. As before, the discount will not apply to special parts or sales flyers. The new arrangement provides the Canadian supplier with a large inventory of original equipment and aftermarket spares. Order something Cliff doesn't have in stock and he says he'll get it from the Vermont office and handle all customs hassles.

Meanwhile, over in Mechanicville, it's busines as usual. Steve Springer says the new competitor has made "no real change in the marketplace."

Atlantic British Ltd. is preparing its 22nd anniversary edition of Roverlog magazine. Steve says that because the company has been around so long, its spot in the markletplace is sound. "Land Rover is not being imported into North America so it's a very limited market. Range Rover on the other hand is really taking off and we're shaping our business to fill that market ", says Steve.

The Range Rover parts portion of AB Ltd. is expanding and the company has seen an increase in used Range Rover sales.

For Land Rovers, Steve says the complete rebuild business is increasing too. "We've seen a hugh increase in our frame over service. We've changed suppliers for our galvanized frames and improved specifications over the original equipment."

He said recent improvements have also been made to the mail order section of AB Ltd. New personel, training and expanded business hours are some of the areas he and co-owner Dick Taylor have been working on." We're now open from 7:30 am to 7 pm during the week. We're looking at weekend hours but no decision has been made yet." he said.

"And we're still planning to hold all the usual activities we've had for years. We'll have the annual rally next summer as always."




