FIRST THE HEADLINES: T-Cat makes it to Alaska---well, most of them do anyway. The Rovers North Ralley sees a record number of OVLR members and friends. The British Invade Vermont in September and we have lotsa bits, pieces, parts and accessories for sale.

Now the details. Last report comes from Trans-Canada/Alaska Tour unofficial contact and Nova Scotian John Cranfield over a pint at the Rovers North ralley. Initially planned as a 50-vehicle tour, the little expedition was whittled down to seven vehicles when it set out from Halifax July 1. John reported that five of the originals limped, squeeked, and "pockataqweeped" into Anchorage several days ago. Organizer Ron Mowry was unceremoniously dumped from the tour by another vehicle which "T-boned" the Range Rover in the Calgary area. Ron, his son and a young French lad along for the ride were injured but are recovering nicely. His daughter escaped any serious damage. The aging Rangy however, was swept into a Hefty Bag and tossed in the Dumpster. The five treckers dipped their wheels into the Pacific to signal an end to the odessey that began more than a month before in Halifax narbour.

Along the way OVLR got a chance to meet the 15 human participants when they spent the night in Ottawa July 10. The little caravan—three from overseas, three from the US and John Cranfield—pulled into the Lebreton Flats campground after dark to the applause of a dozen OVLR members. After a round of handshakes and celebatory cap—snapping, Dave Meadows chauffeured a US Range Rover driver to Ottawa airport to pick up a rented car for an overnight trip to Rovers North and a accelerator cable. (complicated, eh) While some shopped for groceries, others headed for bed and the rest set out with their new Ottawa friends in search of the perfect pizza before tucking in for the night.

Seven o'clock came early next morning as the club kitchen trailer pulled up to a huge tent outside the Navy Association Mess on Victoria Island. Within an hour, the first of 70 eggs, 10 pounds of sausages, piles of toast, fresh fruit, juice and coffee were being dished up. When it was over, Al "Greasy spoon "Bates and his happy crew had served an "all-you-can-eat breakfast" to 34 T-CATers, OVLR members and their friends.

After cleanup, Pres Jason, in charge of providing emergency repairs, headed out to his shop with a T-CAT 109 and a headache-inducing exhaust leak. While Jason and brother Jerry dealt with the crippled six-cylinder, another T-Cat member took the opportunity to replace a leaking nub seal with emergency OVLR supplies made available for the event. While the mechanical repairs were underway, Al, in his topless 107 "Sally", toured several other T-CATers around Parliament Hill.

That afternoon, after handshakes and gift-giving, the group pulled out for Picton well fed, toured out and mechanically sound. A report from the Toronto Area Land Rover club said they arrived at Richard Copples' late that night, did a little off-roading the next day, then headed for Manitoulin Island where Cranfield waved goodbye. Maybe someday Ron Mowry will show us his diaries of the whole tour. Should be good reading.

A lot of work went into OVLR's contribution to T-CAT. When contacted by Ron almost two years ago, the club offered to provide communications and emergency mechanical support and help with accommodations. During the past year as we got closer to the date, the details that needed attention multiplied tenfold. That was when VP Yves Fortin took over as co-ordinator for the event. Before spring melted winter's snow away, Yves was comparing rates from campsites and motels, negotiating with the Navy Mess, writing letters, contracting accommodation, sorting through tourist brochures, heating up the phone lines to Ron's home in Maine, a contact in Quebec City to help with campsites there, and all around Ottawa.

The day before they arrived, he was on the phone to Quebec city and Waterloo checking to see if they were on schedule. Later he put the finishing touches on the information kits to be handed out to the T-Caters. He was first at Lebreton Flats Friday afternoon to set up the welcome wagon. He was there when the tired tour arrived six hours late and he was still there when they bedded down around midnight.

He was on the breakfast crew at dawn Saturday--when he wasn't darting off for more bread or looking for T-CATers lost at the campground or delivering breakfast to others stalled at a nearby laundromat. He was there to provide a little history on The Hill and wave goodbye when it was finally over. Occasionally, he had help, but most of the work and all the responsibility fell to Yves alone.

Earlier this week at the monthly meeting, President Jason led the applause and thanked Yves for the superb effort that made our contribution to the cross Canada tour such a success. Jason's remarks echoed the sentiments of Ron Mowry and the T-CAT members. They were amazed at the organization, tickled with breakfast and the tourist treatment and extremely thankful for the mechanical nelp. OVLR did what it was set up to do: Provide for the care and feeding of Land Rovers, lend a helping hand to their owners and have a good time while doing it. A big chunk of the credit for that goes to VP Yves Fortin.

We're sending copies of the group photo to T-CAT participants. And, just for your info, here they are: Jeffery Guyee from Pennsylvania, Walter Jammey of Vermont, Cheryl and Arthur Person out of Mississippi, and of course Ron Mowry of Maine and good 'ol John Cranfield from some obscure province on the east coast.

Now for the hard ones: Rene van Boekel of Holland, Kaija-Liisa and Raimo Toivonen of Sweden and Helena and Jaakko Pohjantuli from Finland. Don't try to pronounce these. You'll hurt yourself.

Apologies if we didn't get them right. They sure were nice people.

Well if you have not already heard it on the grapevine its official. LAND ROVER DEFENDERS are to be sold in CANADA this year. About 25 units of 110 station wagons are coming. they will be fitted with a number of luxury items as standard. The engine will a 3.9 litre engine, the biggest ever fitted as standard in any Land Rover. Also standard is a very fancy roof rack and roll bar system and a winch at the front. These are a far cry from the '74 88's that last came to this country. As for price, Land Rover Canada says they are trying to keep it under \$56,000!!!! I understand that Brian Adams (a famous Canadian musician for those of you over 40!) is to be given one as a good will gesture by Land Rover. I'll keep you posted as to developments.

It seems that every time the newsletter deadline comes around all the interesting things happen. For instance I had just handed my copy to McD when I was visited by John and Vanessa Ross. This British couple are travelling around the world in a Land Rover 127 crew cab. The vehicle once belonged to a hydro company in England and has been fitted with a Mazda 3.5 litre diesel engine especially for the trip.
